Critique Skeleton

Directions: If you follow these directions, you shall write a good critique of a item, book, essay, event, or person. The first step is to write the second paragraph. The second step is to write third paragraph. The third step is to write the first paragraph and combine the strongest strength and weakness to make the thesis sentence. Then, complete the critique skeleton, and make sure you have (at least) the proper number of sentences. The final step is to copy the sentences from the skeleton onto a clean sheet of lined paper. Remember to indent each paragraph at least half an inch, and to check for spelling or punctuation errors. The title should be centered on the top line of the final copy.

I. First Paragraph (three sentences)

Introduction sentence (this sentence introduces the subject of the item to be critiqued to the reader. It is a general statement about the subject of the item, but does not mention the item.)

Summary sentence (this sentence identifies the item and summarizes it in one sentence. If possible, include the date the item was created in parentheses immediately behind the name of the item.)

THESIS SENTENCE (this sentence is the backbone of the paper. It consists of the item's greatest strength, a conjunction*, then the item's greatest weakness.)

II. Second Paragraph (four sentences that describe the item's strengths)
