The death toll for the novel coronavirus is highest is in the African American community. A Practical Guide for Single Saints Who Live Alone during Quarantine by Dr. Debra Johnson, Editor-in-Chief

The term "single" encompasses a variety of lifestyles among saints. Many singles are not alone during quarantine because they are sharing their living quarters with parents, siblings, nieces, nephews, and/or children. What can the single saint, who lives alone during lockdown, do?

1. Contact a family member or saint each day, just to encourage that person. The potentially stressful situation of the single saint in solitary is similar to David's living quarters during those years of persecution that preceded his eventual kingship. David was in the cave Adullam, which means hiding place or refuge. During this challenging time, David's brethren and father's relatives gathered around him. Make a list of all family members or saints who live alone whom you can visit by phone: "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world" (James 1:27).

2. Join a daily prayer line. Singles who live alone may crave the fellowship of the saints more acutely than saints who live with others. The Scriptures instruct: "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another..." (Hebrews 10:25). Legally, many saints cannot physically assemble, but we can fellowship in prayer. The ISPA prayer line is in its fourth year of existence. Access information is in the upper left corner of page 1 of this newsletter.

3. Celebrate important events or have a worship service on Facebook Live or on the Zoom application. Inquire whether your pastor or choir

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director will set up a Zoom testimony service for saints who would appreciate face-to-face fellowship. Zoom can be downloaded for free and serves as an online location for a monthly Singles' meeting.

4. Enjoy hobby time. While David was living in the cave

with his family members, he began to develop his leadership skills: "And every one that was in distress, and every one that was in debt, and every one that was discontented, gathered themselves with him; and he became captain over them; and there were with him about four hundred men" (1 Samuel 22:2).

Which gifts do you have that have not been utilized? How can you grow your ministry or increase the skills required for your ministry during guarantine? Use this time to branch out in the direction you feel God wants you to grow. Learn to play that instrument you bought years ago or learn a second instrument. See if there are online groups that meet in cyberspace to discuss a hobby or activity that there was no time for before quarantine. The Scriptures indicate: "...through idleness of the hands the house droppeth

through" (Ecclesiastes 10:18). Fix your dwelling, plant a garden, or write a book! Check out exercise videos on YouTube for a daily workout session and finetune that diet to get your weight to a healthy Body Mass Index (BMI). Quarantine won't last forever.

5. Deepen your commitment to God, The great prophet Elijah slept in a cave and had an intense encounter with God: "And he came thither into a cave, and lodged there; behold, the word of the Lord came unto hm, and He said, What doest thou here, Elijah?" (1 Kings 19:9). Now is the time to establish a spiritual schedule by praying for a set period each day and by daily reading a designated portion of Scriptures. As singles, we can always be mindful of the spiritual freedom inherent in our lifestyle: "But I would have you without carefulness. He that is unmarried careth for the things that belong to the Lord, how he may please the Lord.." (1 Corinthians 7:32).

Elijah was in the cave when he had a meeting with God that edified him and clarified his perceptions. David's victory was in the cave because God delivered Saul into his hands during that time: "Behold, this day thine eyes have seen how that the Lord hath delivered thee to day into mine hand in the cave: and some bade me kill thee: but mine eye spared thee: and I said, I will not put forth mine hand against my lord; for he is the LORD's anointed" (1 Samuel 24:10). Although today's single saints live in apartments and homes instead of caves, we can still experience victory during our solitude. To be on lockdown with the Lord Jesus Christ is the sweetest place on earth anyone could ever be.
